Graham Brown Tribute - Chris Baldwin

Every member of the Daventry Photographic Society knew Graham. He was the vice chairman and the competitions secretary.

We all knew him because he was the one who arrived early every week to set up the club computer and projector. He was the one there at the club when we arrived and was often the last one to go because he knew how to put everything away.

He was the one we sent our competition photos and print names to. He was the one who then always promptly sent out the results.

He was the one that often alerted us to, or organised our club outings.

He was the one that deputised for the chairman and welcomed judges and speakers or thanked members for their contributions when the chairman was absent.

Yes, we all knew Graham because he was such an important and dedicated member of the club, however, did we know him well?

One member that did know Graham very well was Chris Baldwin. They became firm friends when Chris's wife Dawn, who worked at Cummins, introduced Graham to Chris. Graham had noticed some photos Chris had taken on Dawn's reception desk and asked about them. That was how they got to know each other and a close friendship developed based initially on the shared interest and love of photography.

As their friendship grew they attended courses together enjoying each other's company especially on any journeys to and from the course venues. Afterwards they would compare observations, lessons learnt and images. They were always courteous to each other and would discuss what photos they would use in a club competition if they thought they both might use a similar image. Graham was doing well in the league this year and it is poignant that he should have won the last competition he entered. He was, though, able to enjoy that achievement as evidenced by his congratulating himself when he circulated the results email.

Graham's love of wildlife was well known especially his fondness for bears. He had been on two recent photographic trips in this regard. Chris mentioned that on a recent trip to his sister, who lives in Canada, Graham had tried to persuade his nephew to hold his wedding at an important time of year on the bear calendar. Graham was going to be the photographer at his nephew's wedding but he was hoping it would coincide with a trip to see the bears feeding on salmon in Alaska.

Graham diligently compiled a book of the best images he had taken each year. These books are a testament to the talent that Graham had as a photographer. He was also a well-respected metallurgist at Cummins. He achieved his degree at Aston University and joined Cummins around 2002 and was a senior manager in the metallurgy department. His knowledge was often called upon as a trouble-shooter and asked to attend meetings in Chicago and Germany.

Graham was also a talented cook and Chris mentioned he would often turn up on his doorstep bearing muffins or fruitcakes. Not surprisingly he liked eating good food too and was a fan of Dawn's cooking. He became a regular visitor to the house to share an evening meal with Chris and Dawn. I said I remembered having to 'fight' Graham for the club fig biscuits - another favourite of his. Chris said he was also very keen on mince pies which

In addition to cooking Graham enjoyed reading, his favourite being fantasy books. A few years ago Graham was a keen hockey player but he had given that up and so he and Chris had developed a routine of going to the cinema on Thursdays. Their arrangement being whoever drove also bought the ice-creams. Chris thinks the portion size they ordered had increased over the years. Another favourite of theirs was fish & chips at the White Horse in Norton which they would eat in the pub — I wondered how they were making time for photography.

However, Graham not only made time for photography as evidenced by his images but he also made time for people.

As one club member said to me he always had a smile for you. He was well known for helping those that asked for advice with their cameras and the like. In addition he frequently took photographs of events for Daventry Town Council. Until his mother recently passed away Graham also spent his weekends staying with her and looking after her needs.
